Humanities 112: Cultures, Civilizations, and Ideas Modernity and Tradition

Course Description and Objectives

This course is the second in a two-semester sequence that considers the meaning of culture: what it is, how it functions, and how we participate in it. Here, we will read texts from the European Middle Ages to the contemporary moment. We will consider the role of narrative and text in building and defining civilizations, and how individuals engage with their culture's stories. We will also look at the tensions between reason and emotion in the creation of our modern world. In doing so we will ask questions such as: How do these texts engage with history and/or literary tradition? How does fiction affect cultural narratives? What is the relationship between reason and emotion? Who is capable of reason and who is not? Who is beyond the reach of sympathy? We will grapple with these questions and others while developing skills in critical reading, analytical writing, and oral discussion.

Course Requirements

Participation (10%): This course will be in a seminar rather than lecture format, which means that students are expected to actively participate in the class. To do so, students are expected to regularly attend class, having done all the reading, and contribute to discussion. You cannot participate if you are not present. You cannot participate without bringing a hard (printed) copy of the assigned text(s) to class. Discussion is a low-stakes space for asking questions and testing out ideas with your peers, so any contribution is valuable. If you have a question, odds are that others have the same one so please ask!

Short Assignments (30%): Each in-class writing assignment is worth 10 points. Students will write short answers to 1-2 discussion questions, citing specific places in the text. Since they are scheduled in advance (i.e. not pop quizzes), all assignments will be counted towards the final grade.

Course Project (30%): Students will adapt either City of Ladies or Othello to another medium, accompanied by a short reflection, for 100 points. A more detailed rubric will follow.

Final Exam (30%): The final exam will be timed essays based on provided prompts, referencing any text in the course, for 100 points. A more detailed rubric will follow.

Exceptions may be granted for extenuating circumstances. The hour totals include the entire semester. The 20% is the absolute maximum you can miss and still pass the class. Life is unexpected and you never know when you may need to miss class. Barring extenuating circumstances, no exceptions will be made.

Communication: The best way to discuss your work or the course is to come to my office hours, which are Tuesdays and Wednesdays 1:30-3:30pm and other times by appointment. I will respond to emails within a day during the week, but I will not answer email on the weekends. I will not respond to emails regarding assignments sent 24 hours before the deadline or 24 hours after assignments are returned. Office hours are the best time to make up missed inclass assignments or to talk one-on-one about course material.

Plagiarism: Plagiarism is the use of ideas or words of another without citation, either intentionally or not. Anything that is not your own idea and/or in your own words must be quoted and cited appropriately. Any instances of academic dishonesty will not be tolerated. Consequences will be determined on a case-by-case basis, but at a minimum plagiarism will result in a 0 on the assignment in question.
